10. Fringe Wetland Restoration Master Plan for The Keno Reach of the Klamath River

The plan will identify opportunities for the construction of diffuse source treatment wetlands to locally treat agricultural runoff from adjacent agricultural drains. The project team also intends to partner with the Tule Smoke Hunt Club to evaluate wetland enhancement and restoration opportunities on club property. 11. Lower Klamath NWR Water Conveyance Improvements

drain water from KDD and make it available for

12. North Canal Extension

The Klamath Drainage District, in partnership with the USFWS and Farmers Conservation Alliance are designing an extension of the North Canal across Stateline Road to the Lower Klamath National Wildlife Refuge. This will provide the refuge with opportunities to better manage a limited supply to manage the refuge for migratory birds and other wildlife. Among other serious repercussions, Pacific Flyway birds are bypassing the Lower Klamath Basin. A major local impact has been the unprecedented cancellation of the 2024 Winter Wings Festival. A coalition of Klamath Drainage District farmers, government agency staffers, advocates for Pacific flyway birds and the re-watering of LKNWR, South Suburban Sanitary District, Tribes, and concerned community citizens are coming together to explore exciting new directions for the Lower Klamath area.


